





Today is the only Sunday on which we have two gospel readings – the first to remember Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem; the second to remember his Passion. I have often wondered about the two gospel readings in the same liturgy. Why is it the Church decides to tell these two stories?

During the entrance to Jerusalem, we are told of all the spontaneous pageantry – an entry worthy of a king – at least that is the way it seems. There are cloaks spread before Jesus, palms waved, and cries of joy at the arrival of the one who will bring about the desired change. *Hosanna* is a word which means “rescue” or “save.” It is easy to understand *Hosanna* as a single word that captures the hopes, pleas, dreams, needs and expectations of a people who have been occupied by the Romans, made to feel strangers in their own land, and had little hope of improving their lot in life short of selling their soul to the Roman overlords. The people at the gates of Jerusalem wanted a King, a fixer (someone) to change the world they lived in. They wanted a dramatic defeat of the Romans and a restoration of the Kingdom of Israel. They wanted Jerusalem to be great again. They wanted the world around them to change. And yet, it was Jesus’ goal not to change the world, but to change them.

By the end of the week, it was clear Jesus was not going to be the one they wanted. I have often wondered if it was the same crowd that cried *Hosanna* upon Jesus’ entry to Jerusalem that will later shout “Crucify him!” Just days later they are assembled in the governor’s courtyard, but now their eyes see differently. Instead of a king they see a criminal, a zealot, a disturber of their peace. The signs of welcome are replaced by the shouts for death on a cross.

I wonder if there was someone there, who in their later years came to understand Jesus as Lord and Savior. A generation past, he is surrounded by his grandchildren, the family growing up in the early Christian community. One of the grandchildren says, “Baba, I heard you met Jesus. You were there when he came to Jerusalem.” I wonder what story he would tell – would the cries for Jesus’ crucifixion be left out of the story – would he move from Palm Sunday quickly to the glories of Easter and the Resurrection.

What would we do? I guess it depends. We are a people who have a seemingly inexhaustible well of possibilities, and so our stories are of plans, achievements, successes – and we have the social media accounts to share the good news with our crowd. We are not a people who instinctively tell stories of our loss and failure.

Yet, in many private conversations with people, we express the fears and yearnings in our hearts. There are fears about the future, challenges in our relationships, a general sense of impotence about local and world events, diminishing confidence in traditional social structures – church, law enforcement, government, family – and more.

In many ways, we are the people who here, on this Palm Sunday, cry out *Hosanna!* We too want a savior, we want rescue, someone who will restore us and make it like it used to be – fixing the world around us. *“Hosanna. Save us.... but don’t change us.”* And yet, it is Jesus’ goal not to change the world, but to change us. Like the people of Jerusalem, we got a savior, a rescuer, just not the one we expected. What we got was Savior who identifies with us in every way (except sin). A Savior who came, not to change the people sitting on the throne, but to change hearts. What we got was the grain of wheat that falls to the ground, dies, in order that there would be new life.



2. Before coming to Mass please take your temperature. If your temperature is 100.4 degrees or higher please stay home. If you feel sick, please stay home.



During this Year of Saint Joseph, the Church has made a plenary indulgence available to all the faithful who satisfy the usual conditions (confession, Eucharist, prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father, a spirit of detachment from sin, and the intention to gain the indulgence for one's self or someone in purgatory), as well as perform one of the prescribed works, as follows:

- Meditate for at least 30 minutes on the Lord's Prayer, or take part in a spiritual retreat of at least one day that includes a meditation on St. Joseph
- Following St. Joseph's example, perform a spiritual or corporal work of mercy
- Recite the Holy Rosary with your family or your fiancé
- Entrust your daily activity to the protection of St. Joseph
- Pray through the intercession of St. Joseph that those seeking work can find dignifying work
- Recite the Litany of St. Joseph for Christians who suffer all forms of persecution
- Recite any prayer or act of piety legitimately approved in honor of St. Joseph, in particular on March 19, May 1, on the 19th of any month, and every Wednesday

This gift of a plenary indulgence extends particularly to the elderly, the sick, the dying, and all those who, for legitimate reasons, are unable to leave their homes, if, detached from all sin and with the intention of fulfilling, as soon as possible, the usual conditions, recite an act of piety in honor of St. Joseph, comfort of the sick and patron of a good death, offering with confidence to God the pains and trials of their life.


