



TOGETHER -
LET US PRAY ...

Our gospel this week is known as the story of the Widow's Mite. A widow donates two small coins, while wealthy people donate much more. A common explanation of the story is that Jesus praises the poor widow and holds her up as an example to us all because she gave "*her whole livelihood.*" So even though the rich people gave more, it was just for show and only from their chump change. Not the widow, she is "all in" in what she gives to God. The moral of the story is that small sacrifices of the poor mean more to God than the extravagant donations of the rich. And so, I could stop writing at this point, and leave you to think about your weekly offering to the Church or your increased offertory pledge... are you giving chump change, or are you contributing your whole livelihood? I could, but there is much more in this Gospel than meets the eye.

We know we are called to be good stewards of our gifts. However, how many of us will make the contribution to God that is "all in" as does the poor widow? I know that in past years of hearing this Gospel passage, when I was sitting in the pews before I was ordained, and I heard priests take this route in their homilies, I would think, "Geez, I can never live up to that example" and then at some point, "Geez, what kind of God wants that? Maybe those are her last two coins? She is all in, but where is her prophet Elijah who will come to her and promise it will be alright?" In other words, I have not always been inspired to be more generous and have sometimes ended up complaining about what God expects of me – or what the pastor wants.

But now, years later, I have had more time to sit with this simple passage. Here is something for you to think about: If the disciples had been in the Temple on their own, and not in the presence of Jesus, do you think they would have noticed the poor widow putting her small coins into the Temple treasury, while they gawked at the exorbitant offerings of the rich and famous? In the very next verse after our Gospel, the disciples make it clear that they are more interested in the magnificence of the Temple (Mark 13:1). As for me, I don't think they would have noticed the widow at all. But Jesus noticed: "*Amen, I say to you, this poor widow put in more than all the other contributors to the treasury. For they have all contributed from their surplus wealth, but she, from her poverty, has contributed all she had, her whole livelihood.*"

Here's another question: How did you hear and understand Jesus' description of the poor widow's offering – is it praise or lament? Let me suggest to you that it is a lament addressed to the disciples and to the Temple system in Jerusalem. A lament that no one notices the poor widow, no one works to lift her burden and lift her up. We are too attentive to the bright, shiny things that surround us. I think Jesus' words are a lament that we do not see with the eyes of God.

At that moment in the Temple, the apostles are not seeing with the eyes of God. And what about this moment here and now? Frankly, it is a little terrifying to consider what it would be like to see with God's eyes – perhaps it is more than a human soul could bear. But what about God seeing with our eyes? Maybe that is part of the mystery of the Incarnation. Jesus sees with our eyes so that we might be able to see with His. He lives our life, feels with our senses, and sees with our eyes that each of us might discover in Christ the true calling of our own humanity.


I think the good news of this passage comes in what it says about the God we worship; the God that Jesus reveals to us most clearly. This God notices the poor widow, sees her plight, and recognizes her affliction. This God will not tolerate such abuse –especially under the guise of religious piety – and so Jesus laments those who would order their world and religion to make her sacrifices necessary, and yet unnoticed. I think God is inviting us to look around and see each other: those we know and those we don't...and those that no one notices. We are invited not just to see them, but to gaze upon them with eyes of Mercy.

We live in a world of bright shiny things that easily draw our attention. Jesus is reminding us that we also live in a world that needs people to "*Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful*" (Luke 6:36). For that we need to see with the eyes of Christ.

Here is the last question, the one I will leave you with – and maybe it's the hardest. What do you need to do...what are you willing to do...what will you do to learn to see the world through the eyes of Christ? Jesus makes it clear that we are called to live a life of mercy. We are called to notice.







THE MONTH OF NOVEMBER IS DEDICATED TO THE SOULS IN PURGATORY

The month of November is dedicated to the **Souls in Purgatory**, whose feast is celebrated on November 2. With the exception of the last two days, the entire month of November falls during the liturgical season known as **Ordinary Time**, which is represented by the liturgical color green. This symbol of hope is the color of the sprouting seed and arouses in the faithful the hope of reaping the eternal harvest of heaven, especially the hope of a glorious resurrection. It is used in the offices and Masses of Ordinary Time. The last portion of the liturgical year represents the time of our pilgrimage to heaven during which we hope for reward. The last Sunday, which marks the beginning of Advent, the liturgical color changes to purple, representing a time of penance.

The Year of St. Joseph ends December 8, 2021

During this Year of Saint Joseph, the Church has made a plenary indulgence available to all the faithful who satisfy the usual conditions (confession, Eucharist, prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father, a spirit of detachment from sin, and the intention to gain the indulgence for one's self or someone in purgatory), as well as perform one of the prescribed works, as follows:

- Recite any prayer or act of piety legitimately approved in honor of St. Joseph, in particular on March 19, May 1, on the 19th of any month, and every Wednesday

My hope is that all worshipers will feel completely at ease attending Mass at St. Teresa of Avila, and those who have stopped coming to Mass will return. This is an important financial investment in the life of our Parish, and the spiritual lives of all parishioners.
